

CHECKLIST FOR STARTING YOUR BUSINESS IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

WH	ERE DO I START?	
1.	EVALUATE YOUR IDEA Is your idea feasible? Can you make money from this venture? Here is a tool to help you assess the viability of your idea: smallbusinessbc.ca/resource/howtos-checklists/evaluate-your-business-idea	
2.	MARKET RESEARCH Test the viability of your idea by researching the market, industry and competition. Small Business BC offers Market Research services including coaching: smallbusinessbc.ca/advisory/market-research-services	
3.	DEVELOP A BUSINESS PLAN This is an essential step and critical for the planning and success of your business. Small Business BC offers Business Plan services: smallbusinessbc.ca/advisory/business-plan-services to provide feedback on your business model and plan.	
4.	FINANCING How will you finance your business? Explore the Government of Canada website for available financing programs: canada.ca/en/services/business/grants	
5.	BUSINESS STRUCTURE Consider and select the most appropriate business structure to operate your business: Sole Proprietorship, Partnership or Corporation smallbusinessbc.ca/resource/howtos-checklists/business-structures-information-sheet	
6.	BUSINESS NAME Submit your Business Name Request (NR) for approval. Small Business BC offers a business name request service (\$50 + tax) or you can do it yourself online: bcregistry.ca/namerequest (\$31.50). *Business structure needs to be identified in this step.	
7.	BUSINESS REGISTRATION	
	SOLE PROPRIETORSHIP / GENERAL PARTNERSHIP Register the business with your approved business name. Small Business BC offers registration services including a full guided registration package (name approval and registration) for sole proprietorship/general partnership (\$139 + tax) or you can do it yourself online: onestop.gov.bc.ca (\$40).	
	CORPORATION If you are registering a BC corporation, your application must be filed online: corporateonline.gov.bc.ca (\$350). You can use the Incorporation Kit for British Columbia (\$99 + tax) by Simply Legal: sbbc.co/inckit to assist you, or seek legal counsel. There is a Lawyer Referral Service at https://accessprobono.ca/lawyer-referral-service .	
8.	BANK ACCOUNT Open a business bank account. Visit your local financial institution with a copy of your Business Registration Certificate.	



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9.	BUSINESS NUMBER ACCOUNTS Open accounts under your Business Number (BN) as required (e.g. GST/PST, payroll, import/export, corporate tax). GST accounts are required if gross annual revenue is greater than \$30,000. PST has no threshold for most businesses. Call Canada Revenue Agency at 1-800-959-5525 or visit: canada.ca/en/services/taxes/business-number . Call the BC Ministry of Finance at 1-877-388-4440 or visit: gov.bc.ca/pst .		
10.	MUNICIPAL BUSINESS LICENCE Contact your municipality for a business license. Visit: civicinfo.bc.ca/municipalities for municipal contacts.		
11.	PERMITS & REGULATIONS Determine whether you require any industry-specific permits and/or licences to operate your business in BC. Contact your industry association or Small Business BC for more information.		
12.	INSURANCE Ensure your business is protected. Visit the Insurance Bureau of Canada: <u>ibc.ca/bc/business</u> to learn what kind of coverage your business needs.

13.	EMPLOYMENT STANDARDS Ensure you're aware of your requirements as an employer under the Employment Standards Act. Contact the BC Employment Standards Branch at 1-800-663-3316 or visit: gov.bc.ca/gov/content/employment-business/employment-standards-advice/employment-standards		
14.	PAYROLL DEDUCTIONS Call the Canada Revenue Agency at 1-800-959-5525 or <u>canada.ca/en/revenue-agency/services/tax/businesses/topics/payroll</u> for information on the forms required, how to calculate the required deductions, and how to remit them to CRA.		
15.	WORKERS COMPENSATION As a corporation or an employer, you must register your business for workers compensation coverage. Self-employed individuals can obtain coverage through Personal Optional Protection. Call WorkSafeBC at 604-244-6181 or 1-888-922-2768 or visit: worksafebc.com .		

REQUIREMENTS FOR KEEPING BUSINESS RECORDS

If you're operating a business or have self-employment income, you need to set up an orderly record and accounting system. It's recommended that you contact a qualified accountant or certified bookkeeper to assist you. You're required to keep all your business records for six years.
